I don't even dare to say the name of the pandemic that has so disrupted our lives. And these waves that have afflicted us; may they subside, and may our existential shores once again become peaceful places of encounter, places where the beauty of life touches our eyes... and our hearts.

Our world certainly has its frailties and its limits; the gaze cast on it by contemplatives of everyday life draws the gaze of others towards a surprising and acting God who always desires that we continue to be creators with him.
